

## 2009 SPRING GENERAL GRANTS

### Center for Constitutional Rights

\$25,000 New York, NY

For continued support of the Global Detentions and Rendition Project, an amalgamation of litigation, education, outreach, organizing, legislative and international advocacy dedicated to restoring the writ of *habeas corpus*, eliminating the practices of extraordinary rendition and illegal detention, ending the use of torture as an interrogation and detention method and holding human rights violators accountable.

### Center for Reproductive Rights

\$30,000 New York, NY

To support the organization's U.S. Legal Program as it works to advance reproductive rights as human rights through expanded advocacy efforts.

### Chicago Foundation for Women

\$50,000 Chicago, IL

For continued general operating support of the organization's advocacy, grantmaking, education and technical assistance programs and for the Catalyst Fund Matching Grant project to fund capacity-building programming and grants for reproductive justice efforts led by women of color.
